
## Students Invited to Participate in Lyme Disease Awareness Campaign

Pennsylvania students in first through sixth grades are invited to enter the 2025 Lyme Art Contest by creating a short video or poster focusing on the theme: "Protect. Check. Remove."

The annual contest helps students, Scout troops and community youth programs learn how to prevent Lyme disease by educating them about ticks, including where they live, how to prevent bites and how to remove ticks that do bite.

Pennsylvania has one of the highest annual counts of Lyme disease cases in the nation, which further emphasizes the importance of teaching children about tick awareness and prevention measures.

## **February is National Bird Feeding Month**

PA. - It's a great time to make sure your feeders are stocked! Feeding birds helps them survive cold winter months when a lack of food sources and habitat can cause them hardship.

Here are some feeding tips to help your feathered, backyard neighbors: When making your own birdseed mix or suet avoid recipes with very sugary ingredients. Peanut butter mixed with cornmeal is a good choice that will attract a good number of birds and variety of woodpeckers.

Plant native shrubs and trees that provide food and shelter for birds all year long. Providing a mix of store bought seed and native plants to snack on will ensure the birds find your feeder faster and keep them there longer.

Set up your feeders at varying heights and distances apart to help birds feel more comfortable sharing the space with other birds.

Feeders bring many different species of birds together which can be an opportunity for diseases and parasites. To help prevent this, clean your birdfeeders at least twice every year using a 10 percent bleach solution and warm water.

Many seed mixtures targeted to a wide diversity of birds contain fillers that most birds don't eat. Buy seed specifically for the birds you want to attract to avoid wasting it and causing a mess under your feeder.
