\$80,000 In Funding To Volunteer Fire Departments And Non-profit EMS

- Lamont Mc-Clure and the Northampton County Department of Community and Economic Development held a press conference



on the Emergency Medical Services Program (EMSP) on Monday, February 3rd.

EMSP is a proposed competitive grant program which will provide \$80,000 in funding to volunteer fire departments and non-profit emergency services providers within Northampton County. The grants will be used to purchase medical equipment: defibrillators, ambulances, etc. The funding for this program will come from the local share assessment of gross table games revenue. Recipients can received up to \$10,000 per grant per year.

"In recent years, Emergency Services has been underfunded at the state level," says Lamont McClure. "Northampton County is committed to doing what we can to ensure that our residents continue to have access to these vital services."

Applications/proposals for the EMSP grants are due by June 22, 2020.





This month's column features Steven Schwartz, who works in the Upper Delaware Watershed and truly lives this quote: "Many Sources, One Watershed Community"

The River Unites Us: How would you describe the work you do?

Steve Schwartz: 50 years ago, Peter Berg, of the Planet Drum Foundation, coined the term Bioregion. A bioregion is defined in terms of the unique overall pattern of natural characteristics that are found in a specific place. The main features are generally found throughout a continuous geographic terrain and include a particular climate, local aspects of seasons,

landforms, watersheds, soils, and native plants and animals. People are also counted as an integral aspect of a place's life, as can be seen in the ecologically adaptive cultures of early inhabitants, and in the activities of present-day re-inhabitants who attempt to harmonize in a sustainable way with the place where they live. I live in, enjoy, and work to promote the multiple values, qualities and opportunities to conserve and enhance the social, ecological and sustainable economic diversity of the Upper Delaware Bioregion.

TRUU: As a geotourism program, the Scenic Wild Delaware River (SWDR) program encourages travelers to visit local businesses and outdoor sites that offer an

authentic experience about the region's natural, cultural and historical assets. How does your work fit in with this?

SS: As the Co-coordinator of the Poconos-Kittatinny Cluster of the Delaware River Watershed Initiative that fosters the collaboration of 8 conservation organizations working in Wayne, Pike and Monroe Counties, PA and Orange and Sullivan Counties, NY I help form partnerships and connections. These organizations conserve land and community resources, produce interpretative workshops and tours for individuals and families, and provide technical assistance to municipalities and private landowners under coordinated strategies and funding in collaboration with many other regional stakeholders.

TRUU: What economic benefits does conservation bring to the local community?

SS: Multiple Return on the Environment studies have shown that robust conservation has multiple benefits for the community from job and business creation in the recreation and tourism sectors to higher private land values through proper steward-ship to the ability to enjoy clean drinking water without expensive treatment to the resiliency of infra-structure through proactive watershed management

mitigating expensive restoration after flooding events.

TRUU: Much of your work involves partnerships with private property owners. What are some challenges you encounter in trying to balance conservation with the concerns of private property owners?

SS: All of the work we do, from acquiring conservation easements to land management of forests and wetlands on private property, is voluntary. Private property owners embrace conservation when they recognize that their stewardship improves their property as well as their downstream neighbors and they become advocates for the same enlightened self-interest

TRUU: Finally, tell us some of the "Must See and Experience" places that you recommend for travelers that can be found at www.scenicwilddelawareriver. com

SS: My corner of the watershed has fantastic local places for the angler – Delaware River Club, West Branch Angler; the foodie – Callicoon Farmers Market, Equinunk General Store; the fun lover – Equinunk Historical Society with its amazing Joel Hill Water Powered Sawmill, Callicoon Theater, Farm Arts Collective; and so much more!


