
BANGOR - 2020 was undoubtedly a year of change for most everyone - especially educators. Traditional in-person classroom instruction was challenged by the need for social distancing. Terms like "virtual," "online," "hybrid" and "distance learning" became common ways to describe education for most of 2020 and continued into 2021. Programs such as in-person speakers and demonstrations like the kind The Bangor Area School District Educational Foundation was used to funding were being rescheduled and then cancelled indefinitely.

In looking for a meaningful way to support the teachers and students during these unprecedented times, Marc Blau, former educator and Bangor Area School Dis-

trict Educational Foundation and Teacher Grant committee member surveyed a sampling of teachers to understand how The Foundation could help. He received a response indicating that resources may help, specifically books such as The Distance Learning Playbook, Grades K-12: Teaching for Engagement and Impact in Any Setting and DON'T Ditch That Tech: Differentiated Instruction in a Digital World both full of practical strategies to help the virtual home instructors and the HS hybrid teachers.

With the approval of The Bangor Area School District School Board, The Foundation purchased 30 books in total - 3 of each book for the libraries of all 5 schools.

According to online resources, "The Distance Learning Playbook is the essential hands-on guide to preparing



and delivering distance learning experiences that are truly effective and impactful" while Don't Ditch That Tech, provides practical ideas to help find the sweet spot where classroom devices meet students' needs and is said to be a teacher-tailored guide that includes tips on how to handle cart/lab scenarios, develop attention-grabbing strategies, and build metacognitive practices.



All you have to do is pay attention to the signs and you can constantly improve your living space. Severe weather can be the time when it speaks the loudest because of the temperature difference between indoors and outdoors. If you have any frozen pipes, you can be sure that outside air is getting inside your house. It happens all the time but

you don't notice because all it does is run your energy bill up and you have no idea where the source is. But when something freezes, you can pinpoint it and instead of just fixing the pipe, fix the energy leak too. You can also see frost on areas that drop below the dewpoint far enough. I've seen frost on recessed lights in some places. Cobwebs are also a good indication of air movement and they are usually found near sources of fresh air. If you take a bright flashlight and walk around your basement near the exterior walls, you will probably see cobwebs moving and that is a good indication of air leakage. Leaks like that add up and sealing them can be very helpful. Gap filling foam found at home centers now is much better than

the original stuff that was so messy and hard to use.

If you have light colored carpet and notice the edges get dirty, especially on stairs, that's because of air leakage at the wall/floor junction. It shows that dirty air from the attic is being drawn through the wall and into the room. Sometimes in the summer when I go to the second floor of a customer's home I can smell

the attic. I am very familiar with the smells of an attic because I spend a lot of time there doing energy work. When I smell it in the living space, it tells me that there is a connection between the attic and the house with respect to air movement. That should never be the

case so I look for that connection. You need to pay attention to what your house is trying to tell you all the time because you may only notice the sign in one season but energy is lost year round. At a slow rate it goes undetected

but still affects comfort and health and elevates utility bills. Ice dams are prevalent now and they are a sign of substantial energy loss too.

You don't need an energy audit to learn how your house breathes and where exterior air is entering if you get in the habit of being observant.
