Minsi Lake Construction Has Started By Michael Ortoski

UPPER MT. BETHEL - KC Construction Company who was selected to do the construction on a new dam at Minsi Lake has started to bring in their heavy duty vehicles and are creating staging areas for all the materials they will need.

State Rep. Joe Emrick (R-Northampton) will host an information meeting on Monday, to provide the latest news on the Minsi Lake Dam project. The meeting was held at the auditorium of Bangor Area Middle School.

Representatives from the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission and engineering firm KC Construction Company provided updates on repair of the dam and replacement of the spillway, as well as a timetable for re-filling the lake. Continued on page 2

Remedial Work Underway On Bangor Messinger Street Culvert Project

BANGOR - Major repair work to storm sewer culvert.

Bangor Borough residents on Messinger Street have been plagued with instances of flash flooding and partial collapses of a failing slate culvert that passes underneath their yards. This slate culvert was reportedly constructed by a dye and fabric manufacturer about 100 years ago to enclose a freshwater stream, which commences in Washington Township, channeling it approximately 2,500feet through the private properties before reaching Martins Creek.

To address this problem, Bangor Borough successfully applied for a 1.9 million-dollar grant through the Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PennVEST) in order to fund the largest storm water remediation project ever proposed by the Borough.

The centerpiece of this project is a massive 66-inch diameter conveyance system that is approximately 0.2-mile in length. "It's a large stormwater project - probably the biggest stormwater project the Borough has undertaken. We're working with limited space, recreating what should be a natural stream channel in order to reduce impact to the historic neighborhoods in the vicinity of Messinger

The Moravian College Big Band will also perform some newly arranged versions of Mr. Sedaka's best known compositions.

Classically trained at Juilliard, Sedaka's impressive career includes being one of the first teen idols of the 50's, a tunesmith in the 60's, a superstar in the 70's, who still performs to sold audiences worldwide. His prolific songwriting partnership with Howard Greenfield has sold forty million records and includes: "Oh! Carol," "Calendar Girl," "Where The Boys Are" (by Connie Francis), "Happy Birthday Sweet Sixteen" and "Breaking Up is Hard To Do." The Contractor has started with initial construction activities such as establishing perimeter controls, clearing of the construction corridor, and the demolition of a single-story garage structure. Construction activities will ramp up over the next few weeks. An approved road closure along Messinger Street (S.R. 1018) will be implemented around the second week of March and be in place for most of the month. Advanced road closure and no parking signage will be erected, and signed detour routes will be provided to direct motorists around the road closure. The project is anticipated to be ongoing until June.

This section of Messinger Street has an average daily traffic volume of 4,014 vehicles.

Motorists are reminded to be alert for slow moving construction vehicles, obey work zone signage, and to slow down when approaching and traveling through work zones, not only for their safety, but for the safety of construction personnel.

Contractor KC Construction Company will begin using of heavy equipment the week of March 4th. Prior to and during construction, equipment will remain in the west parking lot, creating an active construction zone which will be open only to authorized personnel. Visitors who use Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) property around Minsi Lake are asked to avoid the west parking lot and the additional active construction zone around the dam. Signage will be posted on the property notifying the public of

restricted access points. The remainder of the property remains open for public recreation, such as walking and hiking.

Friends of Minsi Lake, the new caretakers of the lake responsible for rehabilitation of the infrastructure at the lake will begin their phase I fish habitat plan while the dam construction is taking place.

The over 800 fish habitat structures all have to be built and placed in the lake before the re-filling proccess begins in late 2019.

Phase II will be new - bathrooms, docks, kayak dock, roads, sinage around the lake, trails, spillway with a bridge for total access trail around the lake.
