#### **Buying vs. Being Sold To**

Well the advertisements have started in the trade journals for all the marketing experts that can make an air conditioning contractor rich this spring. There was a passionate discussion this week on one of the blogs I follow about what is good sales technique and what constitutes pressure. What it really boils down to is a homeowner making a decision based on all available information. Some of that information will invariably have to come from a contractor and if it is slanted, the decision to replace a system may be one that was based on partial truths.

Reasons to replace instead of repairing a system are usually made when something is broken. The questions at that time are what will it cost to repair the system and how reliable will it be afterward. Opinions from a service based technician and a salesperson may vary widely. There are some pricey repairs I would still suggest on a system over 10 years old and I was accused of "nickel and diming" my customers when I mentioned that on the blog. Here is what you need to consider when making your own decision. Does the repair require opening the refrigerant system? I mean removing the refrigerant and replacing major components like a compressor. If not, and the system has been leak-free and reliable up to this point, an electrical repair like a motor is probably well worth doing. An air conditioning system should last 20 years if it was not a builder grade model and not run in the winter. That excludes heat pumps but they should last 15 years without a problem. The amount of energy you can save by upgrading to a 16 SEER model from say a 12 SEER is not going to account for much in your energy bill. Some salespeople use that as an inducement but you won't know it was wrong until several months after you paid for a new system. Rebates are helpful but \$100 won't go too far if your new system is \$10,000. Some parts fail more commonly than others and for that reason we search out electrical parts made in the USA and ones that are rated higher than the original parts so that they do not fail every few years. It seems that most smaller contractors are more tuned in to a homeowners problem more than some of the franchises but that's just my opinion. The bottom line is to get accurate information and get a second opinion if something doesn't seem right with what you are told when your
