Applications for Northampton County EMS Grants opens on May 18th

EASTON - Lamont McClure and the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) announce that the County of Northampton will begin accepting applications on May 18th for the 2020 Emergency Medical Services (EMS) grants. EMS grants are available to Northampton County volunteer fire departments nonprofit emergency medical service organizations and can be used for capital improvements, vehicle purchase, equipment purchase and training. Eligible organizations can apply for \$10,000 per application or project.

The application process opens on Monday, May 18th, and closes on Friday, June 26th. Approvals are scheduled to be announced in August 2020.
