2020 Preservation Awards

BANGOR - The Slate Belt Heritage Center is pleased to announce the recipients of their 2020 Preservation Awards in the following Categories:

The Architectural Award is presented to an individual who has performed an exemplary act in saving or conserving a historic building, place or artifact where restoration is authentic to preservation. This year's award will be presented to Mr. Robert DiFebo. Mr. DiFebo restored an old farm house that was built before Lower Mt. Bethel Township was incorporated in 1746. Along with his son, he gutted the walls and remediated the infrastructure. He replaced the windows with period windows, re-milled the woodwork around the windows and replaced the floors with milled wide plank flooring. An original fireplace remains along with hand irons. The outside stonework has been repointed and the roof replaced. A post and beam loft and family room has been added with all junctions being pegged together for authenticity.

The Initiative Award is presented to an individual who has shown exemplary actions in promoting and preserving Slate Belt heritage through In-Kind actions. This award will be presented to Ms. Elizabeth (Libby) Bush. Since assuming the reins as President of the Hunter-Martin Museum in Lower Mt. Bethel Township, Libby has spent countless hours in volunteer work at the museum contributing her time and efforts to promoting and preserving Lower Mt. Bethel history. At the young age of ninety-one, she has also kept the Scots-Irish burial grounds cleaned and respectable.

The Special Focus Award is presented to an individual who has shown exemplary actions in saving or conserving traditions or a body of knowledge. That individual who contributes to educational information via documentation. This award will be presented to Ms. Anna Marie Ruggiero. Ms. Ruggiero has published two cookbooks, one documenting the Italians who came to settle in this area from southern Italy. Her cookbook not only featured recipes brought from that region, but also provided information on Italian family life, education, diet and an early history overview. Her second cookbook featured the life styles and recipes of the Welsh and Cornish who also immigrated here to the Slate Belt. Her third book, *The Rosetans'* depicted the day to day family life of the people of Roseto, PA.

At this event, the Heritage Center will also be honoring Gaffney-Parsons Funeral Home for their provident sponsorship in the publishing of the Center's Homefront Book and their latest book, *The Textile Industry*. Their benevolence enabled the Center to preserve, for future generations, information important for historical documentation.

These awards are to acknowledge individuals who have performed acts that promote and preserve the culture and heritage of the Slate Belt.
