PennDOT Seeks Public Input on Highway Safety through Online Survey

Harrisburg, PA – The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) is seeking motorists' input on traffic safety and driving behaviors through its annual online Highway Safety Survey found at www.PennDOT.gov/Safety.

PennDOT will use the feedback from this annual survey to better understand the attitude and actions of the public concerning a variety of driving behaviors.

"Safety remains our top priority and we are grateful for the public's continued engagement in making our roadways safer," said PennDOT Secretary Leslie S. Richards. "The results from this annual survey help us gauge participants' attitudes on highway safety and allow us to adjust our safety activities as we work to reduce crashes and fatalities."

The survey is available on PennDOT's website through August 12 and should take about five minutes to complete. All responses, including the "comments" fields, are anonymous.

More than 6,000 people responded to last year's survey. Notably, nearly 91 percent of respondents said they always wear a seat belt and 88 percent of respondents said they never drive while impaired. When asked how often they use a hands-free option to make or take phone calls while driving, 67 percent of respondents say they either always use hands-free device or never make or take phone calls while driving.

Lamont McClure & DCED Award \$250,000 Grant

EASTON - Lamont McClure and the Department of Community & Economic Development (DCED) are pleased to announce the awarding of a \$250,000 Pennsylvania Housing Finance Agency (PHFA) grant. Northampton County proposal, Conserve, Preserve, and Revitalize Northampton County, was judged in a competitive environment with applications across the state.

Program funding will be used for:

The Northampton Community College (NCC) Energy Analysis Team to perform energy audits in two low-to-moderate income neighborhoods, one in Easton and one in Bethlehem. In addition to training for NCC students, plans on energy conservation will be developed as well as improvements to lower energy costs to small business owners.

• Students from the Career Institute of Technology & Bethlehem Area Vocational Technical School to build obtainable housing units within their neighborhoods.

The development of a Conservation Plan that works with the historical commissions in Bethlehem and Easton to provide low-cost preservation assistance and training. The goal is to preserve 20 older/historic homes (10 in each community) that are owned by an underserved population. Training will be provided by the Heritage Home Program and the National Parks Service. Local Lending institutions may be able to provide some low-cost loan assistance.
