My days have become more reflective. I have been reliving enjoyable annual events that are not happening this year. No doing the wave at the Bank for the Phils with my son's family, no puffed-up pride as Boy Scout Troop 36 of Roseto(and many others) march into Coca Cola Park on Scout Day, no cheering on my grandsons as they round the bases in Little League with my boy coaching them. My daughter lives in Kentucky and my husband and I make the drive every couple of months to visit her and our grandkids. We love going but don't like getting there as the 10 hour trip one way literally kicks our retired butts! However, as I write this, we have not been able to make the trip since January and this 7 month stretch has sorely tested our hearts. So, it is with great anticipation and hope that we look forward to this long drive. Two of my grandkids have surpassed me in height (not too hard when you're only 5'1") and my 14 year old grandson Chance's voice changed, all when I wasn't there to see it or hear it. I miss my family, all of them, even the ones who are right here. I am missing them the way I miss my brother John who passed away 28 years ago.

The virus isn't gone and we won't be totally safe until there is a vaccine. Most folks are slowly transitioning to pre-Covid life; hugging loved ones, returning to work, new phases of education, day to day chores and freedoms while still adhering to the cautions of our new environment. Some have adopted "herd immunity" or even abandoned restrictions altogether, comfortable to accept the consequences. But, a lot of us, me included, are still waiting. Because a stem cell transplant has left me with a flawed immune system much of my life is "on hold". Post transplant, I was confined to the safety of my home for 100 days. I was so sick I didn't miss much of those 100 days. This has been a different experience. I knew I could do 100 days in, but totally underestimated how long this spectre could last. I am on Day as I write this and I have had to redefine what I am made of.

We slowly will get our lives back and the joy will be hard to put into words. Maybe even the words have not been written yet. I am expecting raw emotions when I lay eyes on my Kentucky grandkids, take my place in a church pew for Mass, watch my grandsons sporting events, gathering with my huge family, walking into my parents' home but most of all, those hugs! Oh, those big Italian family hugs!

What are your signs of Covid19? Yes, those messy reminders will remain. But for me, I will concentrate on the resilience, the creativity and the hopefulness of the human spirit!
