Work to Re-Open Rt 611 Between Portland – Delaware Water Gap Will Begin This Week

WATER GAP - Work to re-open a section of Route 611 in Monroe County located between Portland Borough and Delaware Water Gap is slated to begin tomorrow, Wednesday, August 14, as PennDOT received the permit from the National Park Service allowing the work to commence. The anticipated opening of Route 611 to traffic is mid-October as PennDOT has stated that work should take between 8-10 weeks.

Re-opening a direct route between Portland and Delaware Water Gap is critical to the residents and businesses who have been so severely impacted by the road closure.

The project includes the installation of a temporary, free standing rockfall barrier that will make it safe for vehicular traffic to travel through the corridor. While there will be two-way traffic though a large section of Route 611 that has been closed, there will be single lane traffic through the area where the rockfall barrier is located that will have temporary traffic signals at each end.



PennDOT remains in negotiations with the National Park Service over the scope of work necessary to receive the permit to provide for the long-term stabilization of the slope required re-open the road fully. Route 611 has been closed to traffic since December 6, 2022, due to a rockslide that was caused by heavy rains
