The Bee's Find Their Way to Grand Central

A bee swarm was found by the Grand Central Habitat Team hanging on a branch in the parking lot on Friday and knew exactly what action to take ... and it did not involve pesticides. Initially, our site's beekeeper and friend John Stone thought the swarm was from one of his bee hives he is tending to on the Grand Central's property. However, after arriving at the site and inspecting the swarm that had congregated in a tree near the site's parking lot, John spotted the swarm's queen and knew the swarm wasn't from the landfill's hives. "At this time of year, the queen will mate and double the size of the hive," John said. "Likely, someone in the area also has a hive." Bees are fascinating creatures and there's a lot more than honey-making going on inside their busy hives. Queen bees can live as long as five years and can lay as many as 1,000 eggs a day. "Overall, it's a great sign that the bees are doing as they should. This is the key to the bee population reproducing," said John who collected and relocated the 5,000-bee swarm to a new hive.
