9/11 Memorial Ride in Lycoming County

One of the largest motorcycle rides in the country took place in Lycoming County on Monday honoring those who lost their lives in the September 11 terrorist attacks.

Thousands of riders from all over Pennsylvania and the country came to the Clinton Township Fire Hall in Montgomery for the 22nd 9/11 Memorial Ride.

the 42-mile ride has grown from an original 85 to more than 1,200 riders all coming together to ride so that no one will forget.

A memorial service was held before the ride got underway.

Communities across Lehigh Valley, Western NJ honor 9/11 victims, their families

Events marking 22 years since the 9/11 terrorist attacks were held throughout our region Monday.

Upper and Lower Macungie Township first responders hosted a ceremony at 6 p.m. at Good Will Fire Company. There was a a wreath and bell ceremony, and a fireman involved in search and rescue missions spoke.

It's one of many ways local communities are keeping the victims and their families close to their hearts.

At Lehigh University, the Steel Battalion Army ROTC Program held a flag raising ceremony and moment of silence.

At Northampton Community College, one professor is a retired NYPD lieutenant.

"As head of the NYPD 9/11 World Trade Center Missing Persons Task Force, dozens of agents and countless civilian volunteers joined me in my final call of duty," said Northampton Community College Professor Vertel Martin.

"On this day 22 years ago, America changed forever, yet we kept our promise: we will never forget," said Northampton Community College President Dr. David Ruth.

In Hunterdon County, New Jersey's State Police Superintendent Colonel Patrick Callahan was the guest speaker. A bell tolled 16 times for the 16 Hunterdon County residents killed in the attacks.

Warren County held a ceremony at the county's memorial Sunday. "Commemoration for the loss of the Twin Towers, Flight 98 and the Pentagon," said Warren County Fire Marshal Chief Joseph Lake Jr.

In Phillipsburg, the Mayor, AmeriCorps and Norwescap put up 500 flags in Shappell Park.

Keeping memory alive: Flight 93 ceremony celebrates lives lost

SHANKSVILLE — Teaching the history of Sept 11, 2001, and the heroic actions of the passengers and crew of Flight 93 to millions of youth is vitally important to keep the memory alive of those who died on that day said speakers at the 22nd annual Service of Remembrance on Monday at the Flight 93 National Memorial.

The youth who were not here to experience Sept. 11, 2001, personally can see the example shared with America about service, heroism and sacrifice, they said.

The Flight 93 story shared here is now interwoven into an important lesson about our nation's history," said Stephen Clark, superintendent of the Flight 93 National Memorial. "It is a memorial dedicated to honoring the memory of 40 individuals who, on September 11, 2001, acted with such bravery and without regard for themselves, ultimately thwarting an attack on our nation's Capitol."
