Textile waste. For many, shopping for new clothes is exciting. But what do you do with the old, ripped, or items you simply don't like anymore? Most throw these items in the trash. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) When consumers dispose of used textiles, like clothes, linens, bed sheets, etc., only around 15% are recycled or repurposed. 85% are sent to a landfill or waste-to-energy facility. The volume of textile waste generated annually grew 80% from 2000 to 2018, faster than any other material in our waste stream, including organics, plastic, and paper. Consequently, states are initiating or enacting legislation to improve textile lifecycle management, often by restricting their disposal in landfills. WM is exploring new technologies and leveraging strong partnerships to reshape the mindset and infrastructure around textile waste management.

Over 50% of the fast fashion garments produced are disposed of in under a year.	In the U.S. alone, 17M tons of textile waste are generated each year.	The average U.S. consumer throws away approx. 81.5 lbs. of clothes annually.
