Step 1 - Consider the commitment:

one summit, along with sustained work

on the chosen project.

Step 2 - Form a team: A community team made up of community leaders representing a diverse expertise (such as conservation, agriculture, tourism, humanities, etc.) needs to be confirmed to participate and commit to the Collaborative. Each team is required to have one elected official, one government staff member, and one conservation organization representative.

Step 3 - Apply: Each community team is required to submit an application to join the Collaborative. Community eligibility, application instructions, and frequently asked questions can be found at appalachiantrail.org/atccollab
