And electric vehicles need special charging stations because they make your heat pump look like a hair dryer. The bottom line is that you should get the best fuel for the long term and when it is powered by electric, you should get the highest efficiency on the market. Sure you will be paying more than the low end

cost of electricity rises. People who bought electric vehicles so they don't have to buy gasoline will put a dent in the taxes being raked in by government and that won't sit well with them. There will then be an adjustment and electric vehicles will pay by the mile. Gasoline prices may drop because of lower demand and the scales will tip back. The same goes for heating oil and diesel which are essentially the same product except for the taxes. All of the natural gas conversions are having an effect on demand for heating oil and eventually the price will stabilize. It is not regulated by the government so it will settle at what the market will bear.


