Fiberglass Facts

There seems to be a lot of misconceptions about how fiberglass insulation should be installed. Because it is sold at all home centers, I guess people think you just put it somewhere and it works. I'm not talking about the guy who says he put 10 rolls of insulation in his attic and his bills never changed. He should have known enough to unwrap them and unroll them at least. I'm talking about using it in sloped roof applications or in walls that are only finished on one side. The material itself does nothing to insulate. How could it, it's made of glass which is one of the worst insulators ever. The trick to it is that the tiny fibers of glass make millions of air pockets and air is a very good insulator. So fiberglass really just helps air stay still enough to do its job as an insulator. When fiberglass is left unfaced on one side of a wall, the R value is cut in half because convection allows air movement through about half the thickness of the insulation. That's huge and we see it all the time.

An even bigger source for confusion is when homeowners insulate vaulted ceilings and sloped attic areas under the roof. Basic instructions say to add Styrofoam vent panels and leave space for air to circulate. That's fine if the soffit and ridge are vented but if one or the other is not vented, what good does that gap do under the roof? It actually prevents fiberglass from being in that space and insulating it. When done really wrong, fiberglass placed against the underside of the roof deck can cause condensation and rot the roof. It's not as common as you might think but if you've heard those stories you obviously won't try it at your house. Those stories probably started in the 1970's which is still well known for its music but construction practices from that time have been improved drastically. We have expanding foam in cans now and several types of caulking that were not invented then. If the right products are used to make an unventilated space air tight, fiberglass will work perfectly. It needs to fit in that space without being compressed or without any large gaps.

I'm not a fan of fiberglass but I use it when it is the right product for the application. Except when used horizontally fiberglass needs to be in a six sided air-tight space to achieve its rated R value.


