

How could telling the truth cause someone to not get hired? It sounds odd and of course there is more to the story. When someone needs a new furnace I sometimes have to be the one to break the news to them. After the initial disappointment of hearing the news we usually discuss the options for equipment and all the ways the new furnace will be different and usually better. In some cases the old furnace did not perform well because of things outside of the furnace cabinet itself, like the duct system. Replacing a furnace

is pretty straightforward but modifying a duct system is not. Ducts are usually buried in ceilings or floors. Even when they are exposed they can't be easily modified without complete replacement that many times includes some sort of remodeling. Here is an example of how I lose a few jobs a year. A homeowner calls for an estimate after having a few already and I go to meet them. I look over the system and compare the furnace to the duct system it must work with. I ask questions about the comfort that the old furnace delivered and if there were any problems in any areas. Usually there is a room or two that doesn't

stay quite as comfortable as the rest. More often than not an older oil furnace is oversized for the house and lots of gas

furnaces are too. My goal is to match the furnace to the house and not the old furnace and also make sure the furnace can move the amount of air it needs to so it doesn't overheat. When I prepare a proposal for a smaller furnace and also explain that without changes to the duct system the rooms will be no different with respect to comfort than they were before,

I either get no response or a decline from the homeowner. I've been told that other contractors planned to use a bigger furnace and that will correct problems with comfort. Even though I politely disagree with that, I'm not the one writing the check. Oversized furnaces self-destruct in their

own heat. Undersized duct systems choke airflow. Low airflow makes rooms uncomfortable. Higher fan speed cannot overcome undersized ducts. Promising the impossible or agreeing to do a job incorrectly just to make a sale is unethical and I'm fine with not having to compete on that playing field. I still feel sorry for the homeowner because the truth will play out in the future and but will be too late by then to do it right.
