



CIT Celebrates School Board Appreciation Month

The CIT Joint Operating Committee is made up of nine School Board members from each of our five sending districts. They are responsible for approving new staff members, overseeing school wide improvements, and adopting policies, collective bargaining agreements, and budgets. The board plays a vital role in helping our students learn and achieve at the highest level. Because of our board members, we are able to update our facilities to allow for more efficient and effective work environments and purchase the newest technology for our students to keep up with demands of employers. Our members see the value in a career and technical education and are determined to make decisions that will result in the best possible outcomes for our students and school.

In December, our current Joint Operating Committee nominated Robert Rutt as CIT Chair. As the chair, Mr. Rutt runs the monthly board meetings and will serve a two year term. Mr. Rutt also serves as the Board Chair for the Pen Argyl Area School District School Board.

To honor our school board members, three programs came together to create a personalized pen and display for each member of the Joint Operating Committee. Our Machine Tool Technology students made the pens out of stainless steel and brass. They were made using the lathe, mill, and CNC Machine to cut and shape the various parts of the pen. Building and Property Maintenance cut, sanded, and stained wooden pen holders to create a decorative display for the pens. Finally, CAD/Engineering Graphics students made laser printed name plaques and placed them on the wooden displays. Several students who worked on the project came to the school board meeting to explain the creative process and present the gifts to our board members.

By working on this project, students learned how to collaborate with other teams and work together to create something under a deadline. Each pen was made by hand, requiring precision and skill to ensure they were comfortable and functional. Workshop on Attracting Tourism to Bethlehem


