This week, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) marked Identity Theft Awareness Week to help educate people about this growing crime and steps you can take to protect yourself.

Be sure to pay attention to your credit card and bank statements, health insurance claim statements, and your bills. A bill that doesn't show up as it normally would can be a sign of identity theft. Review your credit reports at least once a year to look for any accounts you may not have opened, and always shred documents with personal information to keep it out of the wrong hands.
