The fourth replied," if you don't have anyone to fix your cars, when they break down, none of you will be going

anywhere".

Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area Resumes Operations

Bushkill, PA- With the enactment of the continuing resolution on January 25, 2019, staff at Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area will resume regular operations this week. While park offices re-opened on Monday, it will take some time for employees to re-open other areas that would normally be accessible this time of year. "This week, our employees will be focused on picking up and collecting trash and clearing ice and snow from areas that were closed during the lapse in appro-

> priations," said Superintendent Sula Jacobs. "The staff is thrilled to be back at work, serving the American people and welcoming visitors to the park. We just ask that people be patient as we work through the backlog and current weather conditions to get things up and running again."

During the partial government shutdown, some areas of the park were closed due to unsafe conditions related to winter weather and the limited availability of staff to keep those areas safe and clear for visitors.

Master Watershed Steward Program Call For Volunteers

MONROE COUNTY - The Penn State Extension Master Watershed Steward Program in Monroe County is training a new class in spring of 2019. We are looking for individuals that have an interest in the environment, a willingness to learn more, and most importantly, a strong desire to make a difference in the community. So whether you are a teacher, an accountant, a construction worker, a homemaker, a student, or have another background, YOU can become a Master Watershed Steward. To become a certified Master Watershed Steward, you must complete 40 hours of training and fulfill 50 hours of volunteer service. After becoming certified, you can maintain your status by giving at least 20 volunteer hours and attending at least 10 hours of continuing education annually. The 2019 training program will begin on Thursday, March 14, 2019, and continue on subsequent Thursdays from 6:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m through May. The sessions will be held at Kettle Creek Environmental Center with several hands-on
