Scavello Supports Passage of "Farming First" Bills to Grow PA Agriculture

BANGOR - This week, Senator Scavello supported passage of a package of bills that would help Pennsylvania agricultural operations remain competitive and profitable for current and future generations of farmers.

Bills in the "Farming First" package that were passed by the Senate this week include: A tax credit program for landowners to lease or sell farmland to future generations of farmers. The creation of the Pennsylvania Dairy Future Commission to bring together all stakeholders in the industry.

Changes to the state's farmland preservation program to allow farmers more flexibility for building or subdividing residences.

Updating Pennsylvania's Vehicle Code to allow the transportation of large farm equipment. Exempting milk haulers from weather-related travel bans.

Easing restrictions on the use of farmland for farm-related tourism and entertainment activities. Setting commonsense safety standards and removing costly requirements for barn weddings and other social events on farms.

All of the bills in the "Farming First" package were sent to the House of Representatives for consideration

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event

EASTON - The Northampton County Department of Public Works will hold a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event on May 18th at Northampton Community College 3835 Green Pond Road, Bethlehem, PA from 8:30am – 2:00pm. This collection event is intended for Northampton County residents only. Commercial entities, Businesses and Contractors will be turned away.

Proof of residency is required. Acceptable materials include paint products, automotive fluids, outdoor products (pesticides, herbicides, driveway sealers, pool chemicals, etc.) and household products (batteries, fire extinguishers, flammables, adhesives, aerosols, etc.) Unacceptable materials include electronics, appliances, Freon, scrap metal, explosives, ammunition, radioactive waste, fireworks, smoke/carbon monoxide protectors, medical waste, sharps, latex paint, alkaline batteries, gas cylinders and helium tanks. This is the only collection event for household hazardous waste which will be offered for Northampton County residents in 2019.
