

#### Exclusively in the Blue Valley Times Think Like Water


The earth is unique for a lot of reasons. One of them is that we have water. Life would not exist on earth without it. Humans are doing everything they can to pollute it but it is still the elixir of life. It is an integral part of the business I am in and understanding its qualities is very important if I want to design a heating system that uses it for a heat transfer medium. Water interacts with almost everything it touches. If it penetrates a surface in the winter, it can freeze there and exert tons of pressure dislodging huge boulders when it expands. It makes our skin cooler when it evaporates, and when it is condensed out of the humid air in your home, it feels so much better inside at any given temperature.

Water has rules though and if you don't follow them you will be sorry. A highly respected author I follow once penned "think like water" in one of his books. That sounds odd but if you are trying to solve a problem where water is a factor, that is exactly what you have to do.

We have several calls every week in this season where air conditioning systems are malfunctioning and water is leaking through someone's ceiling or all over their basement floor. Many times it is because the installer did not think like water. Rule number 1, water takes the easiest path to a lower place. A drain pipe from an air conditioner needs to pitch down to wherever it ends. The more pitch the better but systems in attics usually don't have a lot of room for that so some installers break the rules and think the water won't notice. A proper installation will have a secondary drain pan installed under the whole unit in the attic but there are even ways of doing that wrong. If the primary drain doesn't work and water finds itself in the secondary pan, it still wants to go somewhere from there. If you don't give it a better plan, it will end up coming through your ceiling to let you know someone broke the rules and it will bring some drywall with it for effect.

We play by all the rules of water and we even use safety switches that will detect if something blocked its path and is trying to cause an overflow. Algae can do that in a small pipe but it doesn't have to be a disaster. Plan for the unexpected and respect the rules of water.

### Calling on the FCC to Protect Your Phone from Spoofers

NAZARETH - Calls from telemarketers have long been an issue. However, the calls became easier to ignore when caller ID became popular. Then, it worsened as our cell phones, in addition to our land lines, fell victim.

Whether it's late in the evening or even on holidays, the calls persist. However, it transitions from annoying to dangerous when scammers spoof calls, which is when a call shows a different name or phone number than is actually associated with

the caller. It may look like the call is from the recipient's insurance company or bank, for example, so the caller can lure people into answering and then trick them into sharing their personal information or hard-earned money.

My colleagues and I in the House have recognized this problem



and are determined to better protect Pennsylvanians.

We unanimously supported a resolution urging Congress to grant additional authority to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to stop unwanted robocalls and spoofing, as well as to educate the public on how to report illegal calls.

Spam calls are the most frequent complaint received by the FCC, and it's time to do something about it.

While we implore the FCC to stop the harassment of Pennsylvanians through their own devices, residents can take action to limit another form of harassment – unwanted calls from telemarketers.

There are two Do Not Call Lists available: the National Do Not Call List and the Pennsylvania Do Not Call List. Register your cell phone and land line numbers with the PA list by calling 888-777-3406 and the national list by calling 888-382-1222. Both phone numbers are toll free.
