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Everything you buy has a finite lifespan. For things not attached to your home, you may be able to resell it if you no longer need it. Like a lawn mower or a car. So it is unusual for many people to know how long something actually lasts. If you thought about it and knew the cost, you could break things down into a dollarsper-year price. I don't advise this though because it really adds up and can bring you to a realization that things are very expensive. For example, you need a new washing machine. You don't want to buy something to cheap because you want something that will last. You read reviews and ask others what they have and settle

for a good name brand front loading model for \$1000. It makes it through the warranty period but at the 5 year mark it develops a knocking sound so you call for service. The repair technician finds that the drum is cracked which he says he has seen numerous times with this brand. You can replace the drum for \$800 or junk the machine. That repair isn't worth the investment in my opinion. So that machine cost you \$200 a year to own. I don't think that's a good value. That's my story and I will never own another washing machine of that brand.

If you replaced the air conditioner in your home and the cost was \$5000 what should you expect? One consideration is the warranty. 10 years on all parts is good because you won't get stuck with

a washing machine story like mine. How about a lifetime warranty on the most expensive part in the system too? Yes, that's comforting. Plan for 20 years because nothing that expensive should wear out any sooner. I'm speaking from experience here. There may be some repairs needed and of course maintenance but no obsolescence and no huge repair bills. That comes out to \$250 per year. I have systems lasting 30 years that are just beginning to fail now. That's \$166 per year. You could go with the \$4500 system but the warranty is much shorter on all parts and it's a sure bet that it will

cost you more in the end. You can't always know which things to invest more money into initially and you certainly can't get the best of everything, but once you get stung a time or two it makes the high end warranties and brand track record more important in the decision process.
