### **October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month**

Bushkill TWSP - I am proud to report that we in the state House of Representatives recently voted unanimously to approve House Resolution 467, designating October as Domestic Violence Awareness Month in Pennsylvania.

As one of the most chronically underreported crimes, it is important to recognize that domestic violence affects men and women of all racial, ethnic, religious, educational, social and economic backgrounds.

Domestic violence is a pattern of abusive behavior used to establish power and control over an intimate partner, causing both physical and emotional harm. Victims may be subjected to abuse, harassment, threats, vandalism, trespassing, burglary, theft and stalking. According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), one in four women and one in seven men have experienced severe physical violence from an intimate partner in their lifetime.

These figures are as shocking as they are unacceptable. During our state's observance of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, we encourage Pennsylvanians to educate themselves on the warning signs on domestic violence.

For those affected by domestic violence, know that there are resources and programs available to help. Pennsylvania's domestic violence programs offer assistance to approximately 95,000 victims every year.

East Shore Parking Lot Minsi Lake Has Been Repaired and Repaved

UPPER MT. BETHEL - As part of the Minsi Lake Dam rehabilitation project, the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission's contractor is re-paving the East Shore parking lot today and tomorrow. If needed, they will extend the work into Saturday.

The contract also includes re-paving the West Shore parking area, which will be completed after the dam reconstruction is finished.

Brand new Minsi Lake East and West Shore Entrance destination signs will be installed at the top of the driveway by the end of the month.
