One of the biggest challenges with installing a heating and air conditioning system in modern homes is the duct system. It has always been difficult to reach a few rooms in the house with a properly sized duct. Almost everyone with a 2 story house and only one heating system has a room or two that just doesn't stay at the same temperature as the rest of the house. Putting ducts in exterior walls is a bad idea and with large rooms it sometimes seems like the only way to accomplish the goal. Architects don't help make it any easier. They design for appearance and leave the rest to the trades. Many builders will now put one system in the basement for the lower level and one in the attic for the second floor. That adds considerably to the overall cost but does help with the comfort. It however puts one system in an unconditioned attic which adds about 30% to the energy required in summer or winter because of the harsh temperatures the ducts are exposed to. Airtight ducts and good duct insulation helps but it is rarely done properly. Once a house is built, there is no way to make improvements or corrections and if a duct system was never installed because hydronic heat was used, it is nearly impossible to have a central system. I did say nearly because there is a system that can be retrofitted and eliminates all of the shortcomings of a system that has to be installed post-construction. It is known as a SDHV for small duct high velocity system. We have installed dozens of them in every kind of home you can imagine. From large historic homes to cape cods and even new construction. I have had one in my own home for more than 20 years and could not imagine anything more comfortable. Recently the manufacturer of this system added a new feature to control the fan and

of zoning a duct system.

What makes it so different is that the ducts are only 2 inches in diameter and even with the insulation they are only about the size of a pool noodle. The room outlet is small and unobtrusive and much more attractive than the large round or square ones used for a conventional duct system. The cost is slightly higher and a conventional system but the advantages are numerous and the overall efficiency is better than any comparable heat pump on the market today.
