Many years ago there were companies that sold electronic kits that came with a bunch of parts and a circuit board and you could build something from scratch. I still have an alarm clock that I built in about 1979 and I'm still as

proud of it today as I was the day I finished it. When I look at that clock I see a kid who learned how to solder and not burn up transistors and who could follow instructions carefully. I have built a lot of things since then but that I'm proud of that because it broke the ice for me in several ways.
